AFTER PENTECOST

We have just celebrated Pentecost, the last in the cycle of Church special seasons and festivals stretching from Advent, through Christmas, Epiphany, Lent and Easter and finishing with Ascension and Pentecost. We begin in Advent by anticipating the birth of Jesus and we end with the giving of the Holy Spirit, fulfilling the promise that Jesus made to his disciples that he would send a comforter and guide who would be with them always.

Has it ever struck you that all these major dates in the church calendar fall into a period of about six months leaving the other half of the year with seemingly nothing much happening? It looks a bit like the way almost all the clubs and societies in Coldstream, including our Church Guild, close down from spring till autumn while folk spend time enjoying their gardens! Some churches call this "ordinary time", perhaps in contrast to all the extraordinary events of the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Others simply call it "time after Pentecost".

And perhaps that's a good description, because for the past almost 2000 years we have been living in the time after Pentecost. This half of the year is a reminder that we too are part of God's story, that now it's over to us to live as God's people in the present, inspired by the love and compassion that Jesus embodied as he walked this earth, responding to his challenge to live as his followers and to be his hands and feet in our community and our world today – and trusting in his promise to comfort, guide and strengthen us through the power of his Holy Spirit.

Jesus calls us to be his Church every week of the year, not just on special occasions. Everyone is welcome to join us each Sunday and at our midweek activities as we worship God and learn what it means to be his people.

A TRIBUTE TO WILL MURRAY

We were all very sad at the death of Will Murray, one of our Kirk Elders, on 24th March after a short stay in hospital. Will lived all his life in Coldstream and was an active member of the community as well as of the Church.

Fellow elder David Tait gave a tribute to Will at the April meeting of the Kirk Session. Will was elected to the congregational board in 2003 and ordained an elder in 2009. As property convenor he made sure that we kept on top of maintenance and repairs of the church, the hall and the manse. Among many other things Will did for the Kirk, he also arranged the production of our parish magazine.

Will was a keen sportsman playing golf, cricket, badminton, curling and bowls, and a keen supporter of Hibs and of Coldstream Football Club. His other interests included local history through the Coldstream History Society, as well as membership of the Art Group, the Burns Club and the 1513 Club – it was Will's initiative to get the round stained glass window sponsored by the Burns Club installed above the High Street door of the Church in 2013 to commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Battle of Flodden.

Will had a dry sense of humour and a kind heart – he quietly did a great deal for other people.

Will's funeral on 12th April was the largest we have seen in the Church for some time, reflecting his wide involvement in the community and the deep love and respect with which he was held. As his friend John Fulton said in his tribute, Will really was "Mr Coldstream"!

Will Murray will be greatly missed by all of us. We extend our love and prayers to his wife Mary and brother David and family.

When we think of all the different activities within our church, most of them run pretty well without a minister! Let's build on that, so that when a team of ministers is finally in place to support and lead us, they can focus on what is most strategic for the future.

OUR ONGOING ACTIVITIES

As well as our Sunday morning Church services a lot of other things are happening in our congregation.

Ladies group: We have been meeting every other week for a few months now. We start with a cuppa and a chat before looking at the Bible. We began with a series linked with the book and film *Chocolat*. We ended the series by watching the film and enjoying some chocolate! Currently we are looking at the life of David. We will have a break during July and August, but keep an eye out for when we start again in the autumn. We have space for more people! The next meetings will be at 10.00 a.m.on 12th and 26th June.

Sunday Sing: Every two weeks a group of us meet at 10.15 a.m. to sing and worship God before the Sunday service. There can be up to 14 of us. We generally sing contemporary worship songs and hymns, but it does vary! Everyone is welcome to join us and there is no requirement to stay on for the service and you do not have to be a great singer! It is not a choir, just people who enjoy singing together. We will take a break during July and August but why not give it a go before the summer or sometime in the autumn. Sunday Sing next meets on 16th and 30th June.

Men's Prayer Breakfast: A group of up to a dozen men meet every other Saturday from 8.00 to 9.00 a.m. in the Church hall to share a breakfast of bacon or egg roll and tea and coffee and a time of fellowship and prayer. We come from different church traditions and are equally comfortable with times of silence and with spoken prayers. We share a common concern to bring to God the needs of the world, our community, neighbours, friends and families. New members will be very welcome. The next breakfasts will be on 15th and 29th June and then every two weeks throughout the summer.

Iona service: On the third Wednesday evening of the month we hold an informal service in the Church hall. We begin and end with responses and prayers drawn from the worship of the Iona Community and each time reflect on and discuss a different theme, continuing to share with one another over a cup of tea or coffee. The next service will be on 19 June at 7.30 p.m., with refreshments served from 7.15 and afterwards. Then we will break till September.

PARISH CHURCH GUILD

The Guild is open to everyone – male or female – and meets on the second and fourth Wednesdays of the month from October to March in the Church Hall at 7.00 p.m. We try to provide a varied programme with the emphasis on "enjoyment". Our aim is to have our members leaving the Hall having had an evening of good fellowship and laughter – helped along by our excellent tea and biscuits! We'd love to you to join us when we resume in October. Details of the new session will be in the next magazine. Subs for the year are £10.00 and £1.00 is payable each meeting. Visitors are always welcome at a cost of £2.00.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT SWINTON KIRK?

With the decision by the Church of Scotland to close Swinton Kirk, a group of us have been exploring the possibility of the community purchasing the building, as we have no village hall, and this is the last public building in the village. We are also determined that the Kirk will remain open as a centre for Christian worship and outreach.

To that end we have been holding services on the third Sunday of every month at 10.00 a.m. since October 2023 as the Merse Church. We are an interdenominational fellowship of some 22 people, and our worship is a mixture of Church of Scotland, Anglican and Baptist worship and we are slowly developing our own identity as a Christian community. Attendances have varied between 11 and 36 and there is a real sense of growth both in terms of Christian witness and fellowship.

We have carried out extensive public consultation helped by a small grant from the Architectural Heritage Fund, which has enabled us to employ a professional facilitator, and to have an independent survey and valuation of the building as well as architectural input for the redesign of the building to create a flexible space which will retain all the church features such as the pulpit and altar.

To underpin all of this work we are now an incorporated charity, Swinton Community Hub SCIO, with the ability to buy the building. Throughout this time, we have greatly appreciated the support and encouragement given to us by Coldstream and District Parishes and the Kirk Session.

We would warmly welcome you if you felt able to join us in worship on the third Sunday of every month at 10.00 a.m., the only exception being in June when we will meet on Sunday 23rd June for a Service of Healing.

Upcoming services all at 10.00 a.m. - Sunday 23rd June – Healing Service; 21st July – Communion; 18th August – Morning Prayer; 15th September – Songs of Praise and 20th October – Harvest Festival. Refreshments and fellowship after every service.
